Westport Museum's new exhibit in collaboration with Westport Country Playhouse explores The Great Migration

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Westport, CT, October 7, 2022--This October, Westport Museum and Westport Country
Playhouse are collaborating on an exhibition that explores an important milestone in African
American history: The Great Migration. The exhibit, entitled *Departures/Arrivals* ties in with
the Playhouse's current production, *From the Mississippi Delta*, the gripping tale of a woman's
triumphant rise from poverty in the Deep South.

Considered among the largest movements of people in human history, The Great Migration took place between 1910 and 1970 when African Americans from the South moved to the Northern, Mid-Western and Western states, seeking liberty, personal security, and opportunity.

Like European immigrants from the late 19th and early 20th centuries, Black Southerners who fled their southern homes often left with little more than the clothes on their backs. Their reasons for leaving were myriad: They sought better economic and educational opportunity and freedom from the terror of violence. Nearly 5,000 Black Americans were lynched in the period coinciding with The Great Migration.

Departures/Arrivals will be installed in the Playhouse's Lucille Lortel White Barn Center in time for the opening of the play From the Mississippi Delta and will explore The Great Migration—and the lives of migrants after relocating North to towns like Westport.

The play *From the Mississippi Delta* is the inspiring, autobiographical story of Dr. Endesha Ida Mae Holland whose journey takes her from poverty and prostitution in the Jim Crow South to civil rights activism, academic achievement, and success as a Pulitzer Prize-nominated playwright. The Playhouse show is directed by Goldie E. Patrick.

"Moving north provided opportunity and safety but African Americans who now called New England towns home still faced prejudice and injustice," said Ramin Ganeshram, Westport Museum's Executive Director. "Despite the challenges these intrepid souls persisted and thrived. The exhibit tells their stories."

The show is an opportunity for two of Westport's great cultural institutions to combine their strengths and explore history in a new and engaging way. The Museum will also collaborate with Director Goldie Patrick who is noted for her zealous approach to developing new theatre focused on cultivating a vast culturally inclusive lens in her work.

"Westport Country Playhouse and the Westport Museum for History and Culture are anchor institutions in the town of Westport and the region," said Westport Country Playhouse's

Managing Director Michael Barker. "So it is natural for us to connect the dots between of our collective history as Americans, Westport's relationship to Black people, and the Playhouse's production of *From the Mississippi Delta*. I am thrilled that we can collaborate in this way with the Westport Museum, with the generous support of CT Humanities, to educate and inspire our community."

Departures/Arrivals will open on October 19th and run until November 30, 2022. The exhibit is free of charge and open to visitors between 9am-5pm, Monday through Friday, and for two hours before performances of *From the Mississippi Delta*.
